

CHAIRMAN'S MESSAGE

A light rain is falling as I write, there is a moderate breeze lowering the temperature to levels not seen locally for some weeks; the contrast with the very fine weather we have enjoyed over the Summer is complete. As this season comes to an end, so too is my tenure as Chair of the Parish Council for I have decided to resign the Chairmanship, but will remain on the Parish Council for the time being.

There are a number of reasons for my resignation; having moved away from the area, I will not be eligible for re-election to the Council in 2015 and so it seems best that I step down now to allow a new leader the time and opportunity to take over and run the Council whilst I am still available to assist as required. Additionally, the new Youth Service is now up and running and is being quickly bedded in, and the new Neighbourhood Planning project is just starting, so providing the new Chair a small window without too much pressure.

In my opinion the Council, despite having a few vacancies, is about as strong as it has ever been in recent years thanks to the recent acquisition of three new councillors; it is also a united and harmonious Council working for the best of the community, a situation which has not always existed in the past. The Neighbourhood Plan process, (which is explained in more detail elsewhere), provides the perfect opportunity for you, the members of the community, to have your say in how the Parish develops over the next 15 or so years. All too often I, and other Councillors, have been criticised over our actions or lack of them, but unfortunately not enough people have participated in the democratic process despite the many opportunities to do so. Few turn up to Parish Council meetings, there are more Councillors than electors at most of the Annual Parish meetings and few people participated in the preparation of the old Parish Plan. I really would like to see this change and see a few more people on the Council and many more participating in the Planning process. I mentioned above that the Council is settled; there are none of the divisions that were apparent when I joined in 2003 and for this I have to thank the Councillors, past and present who elected me to the Chair in early 2008. It is their collective efforts which have contributed so much to the Parish in recent years and which will, under new management, continue to do so into the future. I would like to thank them and the Clerk Steve Coberman for their support during my time as Chairman.

Upper Beeding Parish Council Newsletter - http://upperbeeding-pc,gov.uk/ Where We Are with the Neighbourhood Plan for Upper Beeding

I have been asked by the Parish Council to lead on producing a Neighbourhood Plan which we reported on in last quarter's Newsletter. There is considerable flexibility over how a plan is structured and written. Careful consideration should be made of how the plan will be delivered and this will require constructive dialogue with key stakeholders, such as development managers in the local authority, public agencies, landowners and developers as well as the community and local businesses. To keep the Neighbourhood Plan concise, focused and clear on what are the proposed "policies", a background document could be created, listing the sources of evidence, summarising any new evidence and describing the outcomes of the community engagement programme at different stages in the plan process.


The Plan should contain the following:

explanatory text or illustrations to help with their interpretation.

Vision and Aims. The Neighbourhood Plan can set out the community's overall vision for the area and should include overall aims for its future development and growth. Will it cover 10, 15 or 20 years? These can relate to a wide range of planning and regeneration matters – social, economic and environmental. The vision and aims of the plan can then be translated into detailed policies, guidance and proposals. Planning Policies. The Neighbourhood Plan, once made, will form part of the statutory local development plan for the area and its policies will be used to determine development proposals in the neighbourhood. Planning applications will be determined in accordance with the Neighbourhood Plan's policies unless material considerations indicate otherwise. The policies in the plan could be supplemented if necessary by

Site Allocations. The Neighbourhood Plan may identify key sites for specific kinds of development, such as housing, retail, employment or mixed use.

Community Proposals. Regeneration or enhancement proposals relating to the use and development of land could be included in the plan. It could include policies around improving key public spaces, pedestrian links or allocate sites for new community facilities, such as a community centre.



I am currently developing a project plan and identifying who in the Parish is willing to help, **our first** meeting will be on 11th. September in the UB Sports Hall (1st Floor), anyone interested in being involved please contact me or come along for 7.30pm start. What's happening to Steyning Police Station? Do you care?

A recent article in the Shoreham Herald on the 23rd July stated that Steyning Parish Council has been given a personal reassurance on the future of the town's police station from Mark Eyre, Sussex Police partnership manager. He said: "We don't police a police station, we police a community and that is the ethos from where we are coming. We are looking at achieving best value for money. "It was about working differently, he explained, using the hot desk concept. "New technology means police can fill in reports with an IT device in the community," He said the force would not move from Steyning Police Station unless another premises was available, and at this stage, there was no such option. "We do not intend pulling out of Steyning Police Station and leaving the community with something that is not at least as good as what was there before," he confirmed. "There is certainly going to be no difference in the numbers of police and PCSOs. There will still be access 24 hours a day, seven days a week and police vehicles available." He said Steyning Police Station was a relatively large building housing a small number of people, so it was under occupied. "We are wasting space and we are wasting IT." Mr Eyre said they would consider other opportunities, such as partners and other businesses coming into the police station to share it.

Following on from this UB Councillor Frank Jones sought further clarification and received this summary from Sussex Police. "As a force we are committed to the delivery of Neighbourhood Policing which includes making sure our neighbourhood PC's and PCSO's are in the right place to be visible and accessible to the public. We have also promised that we will not reduce the level of public contact available across the force and therefore where we have a traditional 'front office' open to the public we will not make any changes until we have an alternative which is at least as good if not better. In the case of better this means in a more convenient or accessible location and or working with partners so members of the community can access more than one service from the same location. At this time no suitable alternative has been identified in Steyning however we are continually working with our partners to identify opportunities for us to work together."

We will keep you informed of what any future plans are and ensure Police levels are maintained.

OperationYou will now find it easier to report incidents of anti-social driving in Sussex.
Sussex Police has re-launched Operation Crackdown - a system that enables anyone to report anti-social driving and abandoned vehicles, either online or by phone. Operation Crackdown is a joint initiative supported by Sussex Safer Roads Partnership (SSRP), Sussex Police and all local authorities in the county. It was first launched in 2002 as a way of reporting abandoned vehicles in Sussex, and was expanded in 2007 to cover anti-social driving reports. You can report Incidents by calling 01243642222 or via www.operationcrackdown.org, Members of the public reporting incidents must remember, the registration number of the vehicle, the make, model and colour, so the police can identify the vehicle concerned and make contact with the offender.

NEWS & GOSSIP AROUND THE VILLAGES:

Winter is Coming: We have placed our order for some new Grit Bins and salt to beat any icy conditions planned for this Winter and will show where these are on the parish website once delivered.

Important maintenance works on the White's Bridge, the footbridge across the River Adur north of Bramber. Work on this popular crossing to replace the decking timbers and improve accessibility on the approaches has had to be extended due to corrosion of some of the steel elements. The good news is that it will be possible to retain the bridge for walkers and work is currently in progress.

Possible new Morrisons in Shoreham: Development Company Quora and Morrisons Supermarket have submitted planning application to build houses, retail outlets and a supermarket on the Frosts Car Showroom and Minelco site in Shoreham

Compass Bus 106 - Henfield – Worthing: From 1st September Saturday service is being withdrawn as there are insufficient numbers of passengers travelling to enable a commercially run operation to continue. **Dog & Litter Bins:** There have been a number of incidents recently where dog waste bins and general litter bins have become full and waste has been left by the side of the bins, this is both unsightly and unhygienic. Speeding Motorcyclists on the A283 - Between Shoreham and Washington. The Roads Policing Unit Operations Team currently manage and target motorists and motor cyclists which are causing issues within the Sussex Area. They run an Operation called 'Op Ride' which is a national operation set up to keep the roads a safer place. On the weekend of the 13th and 14th July they concentrated resources on the A283 from Shoreham to Washington and dealt with a number of offending riders for speeding in excess of 100mph and other traffic offences. These individuals were dealt with robustly and will face court action in due course.

The British Heart Foundation will be using the Upper Beeding Memorial Playing Field as a watering stop for the London to Brighton off-road cycling event on Saturday 21st September.

The Towers Convent Summer Solstice in Aid of Cancer Research

The Towers School ran a number of events from Fun Runs, Auctions, Fetes and more to raise money for the charities of Macmillan and Cancer Research UK culminating over the weekend of the 21st & 22nd June. The target was to raise £5,000 for each with any monies over going to the Worthing Hospital Scanner Appeal. The latest amount raised is a whopping £25,000!! Well done to all who took part.
