CHAIRMAN'S MESSAGE

Welcome to our Autumn newsletter. I hope you all had a good Summer enjoying the fine weather. Our parish is a lovely place to be when the sun shines!

You might have heard that the desirability of our area is attracting developers planning large developments. We have detailed plans submitted by Rydon Homes for a total of 65 houses on land next to Pound Lane and a tentative proposal for land west of the Shoreham Road in Small Dole. We have some concerns about the Pound Lane proposals and we think that Upper Beeding village will be affected in many ways if they go ahead, so we have organised a public meeting on Thursday 25th September in the Village Hall. All the plans can be viewed before the 7pm start of the meeting and we have invited Rydon to come along and explain any issues we may have but it is not yet confirmed whether they will attend. Please come along as it's your chance to understand what is being proposed and get an update on our Neighbourhood Plan which when in place will be able to better control developments in the future.

Our Neighbourhood Plan is proceeding, but we need more participants please! We have brought in Action in Rural Sussex as consultants to help us but we need public engagement, feedback on our work so far and just more volunteers. This is vital if we want to have a real influence on the future development of our parish. If you are at all concerned about developments such as the Pound Lane proposals the Neighbourhood Plan gives you the best chance of making a real difference.

Any organisation of volunteers needs to recruit to stand still. Parish Councils are no exception. We have never had our full allocation of councillors and we could do so much more if we did. If you have thought about joining us please don't put it off, come to a meeting and see what we do. Councillors are asked to attend two meetings a month of the full council and two more of any committees they choose to join. It can be interesting and rewarding work.

Finally I would like to express publicly the best wishes of the council to Frank Jones. Frank has resigned from the council after ten years of outstanding contributions to us and the external bodies on which he represented us. Thank you, Frank, for everything you have done for the parish. You are greatly missed!

Planning for Our Future

NEIGHBOURHOOD PLANNING UPDATE

A lot has happened since our last newsletter.

We have a new logo thanks to Poppy Johnson of UB Primary School who won 1st prize in the competition we ran. The runner up was her sister Laila Johnson. Poppy is on the right of the picture above along with her sister Laila. This will now be seen on our future banners, posters and publicity. Well done to Poppy.

We have been in the press and on radio regarding the Cement Works. We have met with Steve Dudman who has an option to buy the Cement Works and Richard Andrew the MD of Hargreaves who currently own the whole site and let a large section out to Dudmans and other parts to a number of small businesses. Both have ideas and plans for the site but until it is agreed whether Steve Dudman takes up his option (he has until June 2016) I do not think we will see anything happening through the current people involved until at least 2017. We have put some of your ideas listed below to both Hargreaves and Dudmans, both said that none of them would be unacceptable and would be considered in any plans they were considering and we would be consulted in any future discussions. My view is that Hargreaves plans would be mainly Office / Housing Development with some plans to suit some of the SDNPs requirements whereas Dudmans are still carrying out some research as to what would best suit the site and meet the requirements of the community. Unfortunately both were against having organised tours of the site but are willing to show a small number of interested people around as a one off which we may take up at a later stage. Some of your ideas to date for the site are:

- Restore facade of main building and Labs opposite as example of 1950s architecture
- Build South Downs Visitor Centre with parks, camp site, shops, cafe, Youth hostel, stables, and cycle centre.
- Sports Centre: Gym, Ice Skating, Ski Slope, Swimming Pool, Rock Climbing, Water Sports, Zip Wire, Fun Games.
- Music Centre / Studios & Practice venue /Theatre
- Sheltered Housing & Care Home Facility
- Working Zones for businesses to accommodate existing businesses but in greener environment.
- Business Zone – for start ups, little pods for new businesses to network and build
- Bus Museum and Artefacts Cement Works Museum & Heritage Centre
- Wild Life Centre and Sanctuary for birds, fish & plants. Utilising the river.
- Education & Innovative Centre for Arts, Science & Technology. – build the skills required for the local area, to include residential and study facilities for students of all ages – Top Primary to University – with day and longer courses appropriate to. Apprenticeships based on what business may eventually be on site. Foster cross-disciplinary collaborations to lead on new ideas and build them into new industries etc.
- House a number of businesses specialising in green energy, companies for research and manufacture
- Tree Top restaurant built in keeping with the country side sourcing food from local companies but affordable to all
- Self sufficient power production to serve immediate local communities
- Art Gallery bringing local artists in to sell their painting and their artefacts
- Riverside Hotel & Leisure facilities with jetty.
- Limited Affordable Housing
- Promote businesses offering Skilled and Semi Skilled Employment Opportunities for the Local Community

We will still be progressing this as a major issue for our Community and intend to continue to work with all parties and the SDNP. Our next action is to arrange a meeting with Coast to Capital Local Enterprise Partnership.

So what's next? Well we have been meeting the Community and getting your ideas and wishes, we are considering whether to update our Housing Needs with a new survey. We have decided to get some expert help and have taken on board support from Action in Rural Sussex (AiRS). This will cost us around £15,000 in all but this will be funded from grants from HDC and Locality/Planning Aid England. Unfortunately this is necessary as we do not have the Planning skills or knowledge in our Team to ensure we produce and complete a Neighbourhood Plan properly. We will also be asking all Landowners to let us know if they have sites they would like to develop either for housing, public open spaces or other uses so that we can see what we might be able to do in the villages.

CALL FOR SITES

A Neighbourhood Plan is a mechanism for helping communities, including both local residents and businesses to influence the planning of the area in which they live and work. It can be used to:

- Develop a shared vision for the neighbourhood.
- Propose where new homes, shops, offices and other development should be built.
- Identify and protect important local green spaces.
- Influence what new buildings should look like.

Upper Beeding & Small Dole is preparing a Neighbourhood Development Plan, under the provisions of the Localism Act 2012. As part of its work in assessing future development needs, the NP Team is calling upon landowners and agents of land within the villages for expressions of interest in applying for future development permission. This exercise will not in itself decide whether a site would be allocated for development by the neighbourhood plan nor will it commit the proposer(s) to apply for planning consent, but it will enable the NP Team to better understand the needs and wishes of the electors within its Parish area.

The site suggestions received by us will be used to guide and inform the preparation of the Allocations of Land and Site Development section of the Neighbourhood Plan. If you want a site/s to be considered for development by the Neighbourhood Plan, we should like to hear from you. The sites need not be in your ownership if you have a responsibility for managing them and they can be proposals for a wide range of development uses.

NEWS & GOSSIP AROUND THE VILLAGES

- **Rydon Development Pound Lane:** Have you heard about the plans for the land East of Pound Lane. Requests have been submitted for two sites totalling 65 dwellings in all. There has been an allocation of 40% of these as affordable homes which would be a mix of 1 bedroom apartments and 2 & 3 bedroom homes whereas the marketable element would be 2, 3 and 4 bedroom detached and semi-detached housing. Pros and Cons no doubt on this development which will be discussed at a Public Meeting being planned in the Village Hall for 7pm on 25th. Sept. Look out for more info on posters and PC Notice boards.
 - **Bus Route 3 (Adur Valley Line):** The trial period of the Bus route 3 ended on the 7th of September, Southerntransit Bus Company who operated the route with no public subsidy has reported that the growth, usage & viability of the route were very successful. Unfortunately due to the financial implications around freedom pass re-imburement, they were unable to keep the route active for a longer period of time during 2014. Plans are in progress for a service to operate in 2015 which could see a longer operating period. In the meantime they would like to thank all local businesses & residents along the route who have welcomed & used the service. - **What a FAG:** Feel like joining the Flood Action Group, be part of a mud roots team keeping an eye on our flood defences and help manage some of the issues and emergencies if we get warned or have flooding. If so please contact the Clerk on 01903 810316 or email upper.beeding@btconnect.com
 - **Broadband is coming to Castletown:** Just seen the Openreach guys planning where to fit the equipment to bring us into the 21st Century at this end of the Village. You never know we might see it available by end of 2014/ beginning of 2015
 - **Frank Jones has left the Parish Council.** Frank who has represented the community for over 10 years has decided to call it a day. Big thanks to Frank who is a gentleman and a scholar for all his hard work and endurance over the years. He will be sadly missed by all.
 - **The Henfield Road Flooding:** We are nearly there to get this issue sorted (only taken 4 years!!!). The Parish Council are now taking this work on from WSCC through funding from Operation Watershed. Approval should be given very shortly and then hopefully work can commence before Winter kicks in
 - **Horton Landfill Site:** Planning permission is being sought by Viridor to infill the site with the start up of a years increase in trucks on the Henfield Rd. from early next year. The PC is against the request in principle because this should have been sorted when the site originally closed. Unfortunately the feeling is that it is likely to get consent regardless. The PC have therefore asked for some form of compensation from Viridor and a 20MPH speed limit imposed in built up areas. Watch this space.
 - **Underpass on A2083:** Work is well underway providing a safer passage for walkers, cyclists and horses under the A2083. Work is expected to be completed in October. Although this has cost more than expected due to access and additional drainage requirements this will make crossing the A2083 so much safer and easier. Big thanks must go to David Barling for taking up this case and making it happen.
 - **Rising Sun UB Annual Beer & Music Festival:** Hope you didn't miss Barry & Sue's fantastic Bank Holiday entertainment for the whole village. There was something for everyone with great BBQ, Hog Roast, Cream Teas, Music, Dancing, Singing, making fools of yourself (or was that just me!) and good old fun and meeting your fellow villagers. Even the wet Monday didn't stop Speedboat performing. Well Done Barry, Sue and all who helped and performed, great community event.
 - **Changing Rooms Improvement:** We are seeking funding from the Wilson Trust to help replace the current changing rooms in the Memorial Playing Fields and provide updated facilities and social area that could be used for Youth and other activities. This would be the start of improvements to our Sports Venue

LOCAL HISTORY SOCIETY WORLD WAR 1 PROJECT

The 3Bs (Beeding, Bramber and Botolphs churches), the Local History Society and other interested people are studying the impact of WW1 on life in Beeding and Bramber.

We know the names of the servicemen who died, because their names are inscribed on the war memorials in Bramber, Beeding, Edburton and Small Dole. One of our members has researched all those people. We are now trying to trace their descendants, so that they can be invited to any events that are held, and to give us more information about them.

But just as important are those who went to war and survived. They are harder to trace, though we have learned of some. If you can tell anything about any of our villagers who served in WW1 and came home again, or if you can put us in touch with their descendants, we would be pleased to hear from you.

A display of our findings will be held in the Gladys Bevan Hall in November.

COMMUNITY YOUTH WORK ANNUAL REVIEW 2013-14

This time a year ago Horsham Matters' Community Youth Work programme was starting. They knew what they hoped to achieve; had a team of youth workers but had yet to put their ideas into practice. A year later and Community Youth Work is very much a reality – the team has grown and many of the things they thought they could do have been achieved and a lot more besides. Thanks to all the other youth providers & the local community who have helped and encouraged the service. Without this support it would not be where it is today.

What is Community Youth Work? Community Youth Work is all about developing and delivering activities, opportunities and support for young people so as to enable and empower them to make informed, positive lifestyle choices. The aim is to promote active, healthy, safe and social lives.

Who are the Community Youth Workers? Horsham Matters now have a team of 10 Youth Workers and an ever increasing pool of volunteers (currently 42). The four full time youth workers are Emma Edwards, Dan Jenkins, Dan Fairchild and Helen Sare. Together with Ben Sheldon they provide the core team working across the five clusters of Horsham, Broadbridge Heath, Slinfold and Warnham, Billingshurst and Pulborough, Storrington/Sullington; and Steyning, Upper Beeding, Bramber and Ashurst. The team are supported by six sessional workers – Tanesha Wedderburn, Paul Conroy, Kris Page, Sarah Bearham, Allan Taylor and Sasha Lindgren, who run some of the clubs & activities that have been started over the last year. Emma Edwards is the Team Leader, Community Youth Worker for Steyning, Upper Beeding, Bramber & Ashurst. There are currently events on a Monday evening in the UB Youth Café, Tuesday there is the Junior and Senior Youth at the Cushman Centre Steyning, Wednesday the After School Drop In at the Cushman and Thursday the Cushman Centre Youth Club.

HYDE STREET OPEN SPACE A VIEW FROM OUR TREE WARDEN (A Fantastic Lady)

What a mouthful! It names a delightful area of grass and trees within our village of Upper Beeding. (I often just call it Hyde Park when referring to it in my Tree Warden notes.) It has a beautiful row of alternate limes and sycamores along the edge adjoining Hyde Street, and a few smaller trees including whitebeam, hawthorn and two memorial trees for former Parish Councillors, an English oak and a wild service tree. At my request Will Jones, the arboricultural officer for Horsham District Council, arranged a Tree Preservation Order covering the whole site back in 2000. This does not cover the north hedge which consists of leyland cypress and other cypresses. Two of these grew extremely tall and the residents of houses just behind complained bitterly about their blocked light. The Parish Council eventually decided to cut these down rather than have the expense of on-going tree surgery. This winter we are going to plant three old Sussex varieties of eating apple; Coronation, Forge and Golden Bounty in the gap. They will come from Paul Barnett's nursery at Chidham, which I visited on a tree warden training day in 2011. These trees have close F-numbers, flowering at a similar time to enable cross-pollination. During the winter of 2011-12 we planted Falstaff Apple, Conference Pear and Victoria Plum, also from Paul's nursery, in Priory Field. This is another open space surrounded by houses. I leafleted them all and got four volunteer families to agree to water them regularly. The Parish Council seems to be agreeing that local fruit could be a welcome source of food in the future.

This week we have replaced two of our road verge trees which were lost recently – a little whitebeam that died for no apparent reason and a beautiful sweet gum which was knocked over and destroyed by a lorry that never stopped to report the damage. I was devastated - it was probably my favourite tree of the many planted by WSCC Highways and the Parish Council over the years. We also negotiated the latest and ever-changing mystique of getting a Licence to Plant in the Highway and planted a rowan on the verge for a resident in memory of her husband.

Every tree planted gives us more oxygen and absorbs CO2. It may also provide food for birds, insects and for us. 'Many a mickle makes a muckle', as they say in the north – each tree may become a part of a row down a road or field, an orchard or even a wood. Two useful references are the Community Orchards Handbook (published by Common Ground) and Apples and Orchards in Sussex by Brian Short (published by Action in Rural Sussex and Brighton Permaculture Trust).
