

WELCOME AND INTRODUCTION

In this edition we give an overview of the Parish Council Finances. The Chairman of the Finance Committee, Cllr Bob Harber, explains the budget and precept process.

FINANCE

Parish Councils are responsible for managing their own budgets and are mainly funded by an annual payment, or precept, collected by the District Council. This forms part of your Council Tax. This system has been with us since 1993; it replaced the Poll Tax, which swept away the old system of Rates.




West Sussex County Council, Horsham District Council, Upper Beeding Parish Council and the Sussex Police and Crime Commissioner all produce budgets detailing the amount of money needed to run services for local people.

The chart on the left shows that in 2020 Upper Beeding Parish Council received 7% or 7 pence in every £1 of your overall Council Tax; the major share goes to West Sussex County Council.

Each Autumn, Upper Beeding Parish Council plans its spending — its Budget - for the financial year which begins on 1 April. Our Budget for 2021/22 and our precept will be stationary. We are keenly aware of how difficult this past year has been, so we have worked very hard to keep spending as low as possible.

Despite the precept request remaining unchanged, the amount residents will be asked to pay will be slightly higher due to the way the Tax Base is calculated. The increase will be £1.92 per year, about 4p a week for a Band D property.

WELCOME TO HYDE STREET GREEN: YOUR NEW COMMUNITY ORCHARD

Hyde Street Green is the new name for the open space in Hyde Street.

Despite the freezing weather our lovely volunteers planted 6 new fruit trees. The trees and tree guards were donated by families in memory of residents Michael Moorhouse and Joyce Weller. This has started our community orchard for all to enjoy for years to come. Six fruit trees, 3 apples, 2 pears and one plum, were planted at Hyde Green by our volunteers. THE NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN

Signs from the Government suggest that delayed Neighbourhood Plan referendums will take place this year. We hope this will happen in May, at the same time as elections for WSCC Councillors. We will publish details widely as soon as they are known. Your vote matters as a 'made' Neighbourhood Plan gives more local control and funding direct to the community.



SMALL DOLE SKATEPARK



The Skatepark in Small Dole is coming to the end of its useful life. There is a need to have a long-term plan as to its future, possible location and replacement. The Council does not and will not have the funds for a replacement Park, so external funding would need to be sourced. It is suggested that a group of focused individuals, including some Councillor interest, might be the way to approach a project of this size.

As an interim measure, for replacement could be some time into the future, and it is recognised as a bit of an eyesore on Mackley's Field, it was suggested and agreed at a recent site meeting that a fresh coat of paint would make the park look more attractive for the residents of Small Dole who see it every day. To that end it was suggested that a work party of older users could be organised to repaint all the vertical surfaces, with the Parish Council supplying the materials for the job.

Therefore, we look to you users to put your names forward to volunteer for the task. We would plan a day once the weather has improved and the timber faces have dried out sufficiently to absorb the paint.

Bob is an active Parish Councillor and can be seen volunteering at events such as the 'Make a Difference Day' held in 2020 where volunteers assisted the Beeding in Bloom team tidying flower beds getting ready for the summer as well as getting his hands dirty planting fruit trees at the new Community Orchard at Hyde Street Green.
